The purpose of this All County Letter (ACL) is to provide all county child welfare and probation agencies (hereafter referred to as "counties") information regarding the Commercially Sexually Exploited Children (CSEC) Program's Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-20 allocation methodology and instructions on how to complete and submit the County Plan. Upon submission of the County Plan, counties are able to access state-funds via the opt-in CSEC Program set forth in <u>Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC) Sections 16524.6 – 16524.11</u>.

Background

To support counties in their efforts towards improving outcomes for minors at-risk for, or a victim of, commercial sexual exploitation (CSE) California passed <u>Senate Bill (SB) 855</u> (Chapter 29, Statutes of 2014). This established the CSEC Program, administered by the California Department of Social Services (CDSS). Annually, the County Welfare Directors Association (CWDA) and CDSS collaboratively develop an allocation methodology for distribution of program funding. All counties electing to participate in the FY 2019-20 CSEC Program must complete the attached County Plan template. Please refer to Attachment I.

Since implementation of the CSEC Program two primary statutes, <u>SB 1322 (Chapter 654, Statutes of 2016)</u> and <u>Assembly Bill (AB) 1227 (Chapter 558, Statutes of 2017)</u>, have improved supports and services for children and youth that are at risk for, or a victim of, CSE. FY 2019-20 Program Participation Guidelines

Counties that opted-in to the CSEC Program in FY 2018-19 will continue to receive an allocation in FY 2019-20 contingent upon the approval of a submitted County Plan. Counties who requested one-time opt-in funding in FY 2018-19 were funded out of FY 2017-18 re-appropriated funds and therefore are not included in the FY 2019-20 allocation. The county allocations for FY 2019-20 will be issued in a forthcoming County Fiscal Letter (CFL). County Plan Submission

All counties must submit their FY 2019-20 County Plan (Attachment I) to the CDSS prior to the distribution of allocated funds. The electronic copy of the County Plan must be received by 5:00 p.m. on **November 25, 2019**, and remitted to <u>CSECProgram@dss.ca.gov</u>.
