OTIP Major Functions

Protection: Funds victim identification and assistance programs and determines eligibility for services for certain foreign national victims of human trafficking (TVAP, DVHT, Hotline, LBS grant programs)

Prevention: Partners with federal agencies and non-government organizations to raise public awareness, provide training and technical assistance, build capacity, and identify opportunities to prevent human trafficking (NHTTAC, SOAR)

Research & Policy: Collaborates with federal agencies to evaluate anti-trafficking programs, streamline data collection, identify research priorities, and make policy recommendations





OVC's Mission



The Office for Victims of Crime (OVC), a component of the Department of Justice's Office of Justice Programs, works to enhance the Nation's capacity to assist crime victims and provides leadership in changing policies and practices to promote justice and healing for all victims.

OVC's Goals for Anti-Human Trafficking Efforts



OVC strives to uphold the intent of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act to ensure that all trafficking victims can access the services they need. OVC strengthens the victim service response to human trafficking through grant funding, training and technical assistance, and leadership in the field.

OVC's Anti-Human Trafficking Efforts



Administers the largest amount of anti-trafficking funding across the federal government and makes awards to develop, expand, and strengthen programs for victims of human trafficking. The majority of this funding supports the delivery of direct services.

Works with the Bureau of Justice Assistance to collaboratively manage multidisciplinary task force awards focused on identifying and assisting victims and investigating and prosecuting trafficking crimes.

Manages a broad array of training and technical assistance for victim service providers and allied professionals, with a focus on improving the quality and quantity of services available to trafficking victims and building grants implementation capacity.

Engages in ongoing interagency and intra-agency collaboration and seeks out opportunities to learn from survivors, service providers, and other frontline stakeholders across the country.

OVERVIEW

The National Child Abuse and Neglect Data System (NCANDS)


NCANDS was created as a voluntary system in response to a 1988 Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) amendment.

Collects case-level data on all children who received a completed response from a child protective services (CPS) agency in the form of an investigation response or an alternative response. Aggregate data are collected from agencies outside of CPS.


DATA COLLECTION

- Annually
- Federal fiscal year
 - October --September
- Child File: Case-level data
 - FFY 2018, NCANDS received 52 Child Files
- Agency File: Aggregate Data
 - FFY 2018, NCANDS received 52 Agency Files

- 52 states submit data to NCANDS
 - including DC and Puerto Rico



CAPTA History - NCANDS perspective



1988

The Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) amended directing HHS to establish a national data collection and analysis program.

1996

CAPTA amended to require all states that receive funds from the Basic State Grant program to work with the Secretary of HHS to provide specific data. The specific data elements were added to NCANDS.

2015/2016

Today

CAPTA further amended to include additional reporting requirements per the Justice for Victims of Sex Trafficking Act of 2015 and the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA) of 2016.

States began reporting data for new CAPTA amendments with FFY 2018 NCANDS submissions.

Who Uses NCANDS Data?



The NCANDS data are a critical source of information

for many publications, reports, and activities of the federal government, child welfare personnel, researchers, and others.



The report is published each January and includes data reported from the previous federal fiscal year.

National Child Abuse and Neglect Data System (NCANDS)

Justice For Victims of Trafficking Act of 2015

Justice for Victims of Trafficking Act amended CAPTA Section 106(d) Annual State Data Reports to request

(17) The number of children determined to be victims described in subsection (b)(2)(B)(xxiv).

STATE OPTION: A State may elect to define a child as a person who has not attained the age of 24.

The Children's Bureau Information Memoranda ACYF-CB-IM-15-05 dated July 16, 2015, informed states that these data will be reported, to the extent practicable, to NCANDS. https://www.acf.hhs.gov/cb/resource/im1505

Reporting Guidance


New Maltreatment Type Code

- 7 = sex trafficking
- All sex trafficking allegations, regardless of finding or disposition.
- Only substantiated or indicated maltreatment types are included in the Child Maltreatment report.

Age

- Victims and nonvictims > 21 years and < 24 years
- Include noncaregivers, as practicable


Victims of Sex Trafficking and Victims of Any Maltreatment by Sex, 2018





Victims of Sex Trafficking by Age and Sex, 2018






Victims of Sex Trafficking and Victims of Any Maltreatment by Race or Ethnicity, 2018

 NCMEC has responded to reports of CST in every state


 Cases included both males and females


 Average age of CST victims reported missing to NCMEC is only fifteen years old




CHILD SEX TRAFFICKING VICTIMS





Where are they running from?






CHILDREN MISSING FROM CARE INTAKES








Immigration Status









Age at Entry
