Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC) refers to a "range of crimes and activities involving the sexual abuse or exploitation of a child for the financial benefit of any person or in exchange for anything of value (including monetary and non-monetary benefits) given or received by any person." (OJJDP n.d.)



Traffickers recruit everywhere.

- Truck stops
- Schools
- Private homes
- Along major interstate corridors
- Casinos
- Hotels
- Traffickers get others like friends or peers to recruit for them.

**Please note, this is not an exhaustive list. Trafficking happens EVERYWHERE.*

SIGNS

Sex Trafficking Indicators

- Prior history of running away from home
- Cannot account for time missing from home
- Living with people who are not parents or guardians
- Signs of a controlling relationship, someone who monitors their speech and actions and speaks for them
- Isolated from family and friends
- Associates with people not their age
- Appears preoccupied, with their phone/s, general hyper vigilance, anxious, angry
- Possesses multiple cell phones
- May express feelings of indebtedness to someone
- Someone else controls their money and "earnings"
- Use of social media and apps commonly associated with sex trading
- Has access to money/large amounts of cash, clothes, or other expensive belongings
- Multiple hotel cards
- Wears clothes inappropriate for the season or possible sexually provocative clothing
- Use of slang words learned from time spent in "the life"
- May have signs of abuse, unexplained injuries, bruises, tattoos, malnourishment, untreated illnesses/injuries
- Involvement with law enforcement, juvenile justice, child protection/foster care

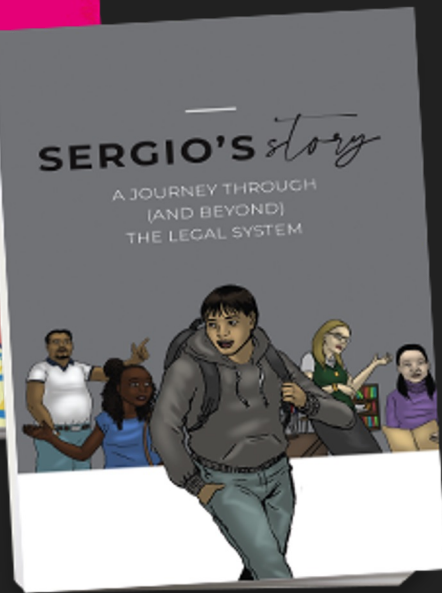

TRAFFICKING VS. SMUGGLING

Human Trafficking involves the use of force, fraud, or coercion to obtain some type of labor or commercial sex act, or in which the person performing the commercial sex act is under 18 years of age.

Human Smuggling is the deliberate evasion of immigration laws by bringing undocumented noncitizens into the U.S. and the unlawful transportation and harboring of undocumented noncitizens already in the U.S.

These are *not* interchangeable terms

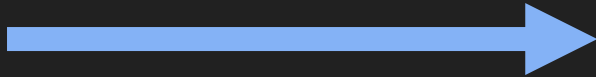
Smuggling is transportation-based and is a crime against a border

Trafficking is exploitation-based and is a crime against a person

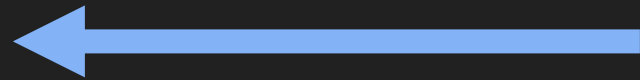

WHAT JOBS CAN I DO?

If you are 13 or younger:

You can baby-sit, deliver newspapers, or work as an actor or performer.

If you are 14 or 15:

You can work in specific non-hazardous jobs in non-manufacturing industries under certain conditions.

If you are 16 or 17:

You can work in any job that has not been declared hazardous by the Secretary of Labor.

- Outside school hours
- Between 7 AM and 7 PM*
(*until 9 PM from June 1st-Labor Day)
- 3 hours on any school day
- 8 hours on any non-school day
- 18 hours in any school week
- 40 hours in any non-school week

work any hours**

WORK ON THE FARM

Youths of any age may work at any time in any job on a farm owned or operated by their parents or persons standing in place of their parents.



There are 11 specific hazardous occupations in agriculture that may only be performed by hired farmworkers who are at least 16 years of age. Most involve work with machinery or handling toxic or explosive materials. Some limited exemptions exist that permit 14- and 15-year-olds to perform these otherwise prohibited tasks if they are enrolled in a vocational agriculture program or have received appropriate training.



Different rules apply to non-agricultural businesses. State laws may have stricter rules.

WORK ON THE FARM

Ages 12 and 13:

May be employed in non-hazardous jobs outside school hours on farms that also employ the youth's parent(s), or with written parental consent.

Ages 14 and 15:

May be employed in non-hazardous jobs outside school hours.

Age 16 and Older:

May be employed in any farm job, hazardous or not, at any time.



On small farms not covered by the FLSA minimum wage requirements, youth may work in any non-hazardous job outside school hours with parental consent.

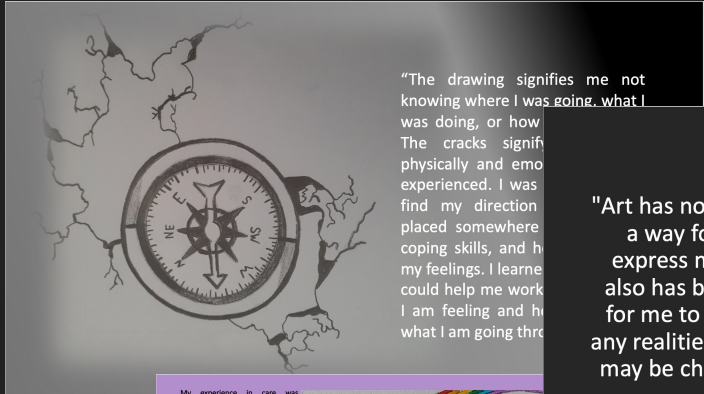

My experience in care was unfulfilling. The Resource Family I lived with for 9 years was just as traumatizing to me as the one I left. If not more so, I didn't have a voice. The placement was approved and monitored by social workers. I felt that given that the adults in charge of making sure I was in a good home didn't remove me - my experience was normal. It in fact wasn't normal, and I was just one of the youth that "fell through the cracks." I was removed from that home less than a month after my 17th birthday, not because the social workers finally paid attention to the black ink printed in their reports - but because I called them to let them know that I left and refused to return. You can only gamble your life so many times before your luck runs out. 6 months later, I suffered from a mental breakdown due to my experiences in my short life. The road to recovery has been difficult. I was 20 years old when I finally felt genuine happiness. I didn't even know what it was. At 22 years old, I began to comprehend the chance of a future. Now at 23, I am becoming a person. I am developing a personality, and a purpose in life. It's nice. ♡

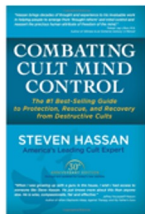
