#### ABOUT NATIONAL HUMAN TRAFFICKING PREVENTION MONTH

In 2010 President Barack Obama designated January as National Human Trafficking Prevention Month. It was established with the intention of re-dedicating ourselves to the preventing and ending human trafficking – in all it's forms. During January, we collectively pause to acknowledge the impact to communities around the world, including our own. We stand with survivors, allied individuals and agencies from every discipline who commit to building a future where generations to come may thrive free from exploitation.

The Human
Trafficking Hotline
has identified
24,046 victims of
human trafficking
in the US.

**CAPTION:** Between 2007-2021, <u>the Human Trafficking Hotline</u> has identified 12,696 cases of human trafficking in the US. 24,046 victims were identified in these cases.

Individuals are often *recruited* into trafficking by family members or intimate partners.

**CAPTION:** In 2020, <u>Polaris Project</u> concluded that recruitment by family members and intimate partners was particularly noteworthy in sex trafficking situations. In situations of sex trafficking or sex and labor trafficking combined, of the 2,448 victims whose recruitment was known, 42% were brought into trafficking by a member of their own families.

1 in 6 of the more than 25,000 children reported missing in 2021 were likely victims of child sex trafficking. **CAPTION: 1 in 6** of the more than **25,000** children reported missing to the <u>National Center for Missing & Exploited Children</u> in 2021 who had run away, were likely victims of child sex trafficking.

The *top 5 verwes* for labor trafficking in California include:

- 1. Domestic work
- 2. Agriculture/Farms

#### 5 WAYS TO TAKE ACTION

#### One - ENGAGE YOUR COMMUNITY

Engage your community to shed light on the topic of human trafficking. Some ideas include:

**Take a Step Against Human Trafficking** – Gather a team to host a 5K Run-Walk this year! Start planning in January with your city officials culminating in an event that is providing local resources and collective action.

Raise Funds for Survivor Needs – Give back locally and find a service provider near you. Consider partnering with them to help host a fundraiser. Keeping money in your local community is key to directly helping end human trafficking wherever you are! Check out our <u>CA Service Provider directory</u> to get started.

**Issue a Community Wide Proclamation** – Partner with local city officials and your county's board of supervisors to raise awareness. Download <u>PACT's Customizable</u> <u>Template</u> to get started.



#### Two - SEND AN EMAIL OR VIDEO MESSAGE

Announce National Human Trafficking Prevention Month with an email to your staff and partners, or share a recorded video message.

Consider sharing on January 11, designated as National Human Trafficking Awareness Day. <u>Download PACT'S Email Template</u> to customize and share.



#### Three - POST ON SOCIAL MEDIA

#### Five - SCREEN A FILM

Inspire deeper learning by screening a film, followed by a panel of key experts or facilitated discussion. Be prepared by viewing films in advance. Anticipate questions and share potential action steps.
