Education can be transformational - and now more than ever before, it is critical that we practice **responsible awareness.** We must move past myths and stereotypes, to share a deeper understanding of what human trafficking is, how it can happen and who it happens to.

Ethical storytelling respects the dignity of those with lived experience by ensuring individuals control their own personal narratives, avoids sensationalizing by **grounding awareness efforts in evidence-based research** and **real-life experience**. Through this process we counter misinformation, respectfully amplify diverse voices & advocate for positive change.

Before You Get Started:

Do You Have Social Media Guidelines?

If you don't already have a checklist **before posting anything online... STOP** and **RETHINK**. Now is the best time to create one! See our guidelines below to assist your team in developing both ethical and meaningful content to use:



	Ask yourself: What is my intention with sharing this post?
	Give credit to the original creator or photographer if sharing an image.
	Use reputable sources (Fact check yourself!) Cite your data or link to the source.
	Think twice before posting a personal photo that may identify an individual.
	Always receive consent & consider safety.
	Avoid generalizations & sensational images (i.e. children in chains or duck tape)
	Check that you are not encouraging common stereotypes or myths.
	Promote diversity - Avoid tokenizing by highlighting a variety of experiences, cultures and traditions.
	Don't portray yourself or your organization as the "hero."
	Ask Yourself: Does this post inspire hope and actionable change?

Caption: Human Trafficking is Child Abuse! Child sex trafficking occurs when a child under 18 is advertised, solicited or exploited through a commercial sex act. A commercial sex act is any sex act where something of value – such as money, food, drugs or a place to stay – is given to or received by any person for sexual activity. Labor trafficking happens when someone is forced, tricked or coerced to work or provide services against their will. Need help? 



Caption: Traffickers are masters of manipulation and use psychological pressure, false promises, actions of perceived love and intimidation to control and exploit children for sex or labor. Human trafficking can happen to anyone – but exploiters often target youth who lack strong support networks, have experienced prior violence, housing instability or are marginalized. 

Caption: Almost half of identified cases of child trafficking begin with some family member involvement, according to data from the Counter-Trafficking Data Collaborative (CTDC). The extent of family involvement in the trafficking of children is up to four times higher than in cases of adult trafficking, showing an urgent need for enhanced counter-trafficking efforts specifically addressing children and their families. #EndTrafficking



Caption: The most pervasive myth about human trafficking is that it always involves kidnapping or physically forcing someone into a situation. In reality, most traffickers use psychological means such as tricking, defrauding, manipulating, or threatening victims into providing commercial sex or exploitative labor. #EndTrafficking



Caption: Youth are often targeted by traffickers with fraudulent job opportunities that are too good to be true! Prevent labor trafficking by educating youth about rights in the workplace. If you have concerns that a foreign national minor may have experienced forced labor or commercial sex, report to the U.S. Office on Trafficking in Persons (OTIP). Youth are eligible for Federal and State benefits and services, regardless of immigration status. Contact the OTIP Child Protection Specialists by phone at 202-205-4582 or email at ChildTrafficking@acf.hhs.gov #EndTrafficking





Caption: Just the presence of ONE supportive adult in the life of a young person can be a strong protective factor and a critical support for healing post exploitation. One survivor of trafficking shared gratitude for the social workers who consistently showed up. "Not all relationships were positive but "the good relationships are what kept me inspired and motivated to keep moving forward and work hard as I rebuilt my life." Remember that just showing up and meeting young people where they are at, can make all the difference! #EndTrafficking




